PRELIMINARY* MONTHLY TRAFFIC AND CAPACITY STATISTICS APRIL 2001

Summary of Traffic and Capacity Statistics

Group (comprising international, domestic and regional) passenger numbers for April increased by 6.4 percent compared to April 2000. Traffic for April, measured in Revenue Passenger Kilometres (RPKs), increased by 8.1 percent, while capacity, measured in Available Seat Kilometres (ASKs), increased by 9.8 percent over the previous year. This resulted in a revenue seat factor of 76.2 percent for the month, 1.3 percentage points lower than the previous year.

For the financial year to April, Group passenger numbers increased by 7.9 percent over the previous year. RPKs and ASKs were up 10.2 percent and 9.3 percent respectively, resulting in a revenue seat factor of 76.8 percent, 0.7 percentage points higher than the previous year. International yield excluding exchange for the year to April increased by 1.5 percent, while domestic yield excluding exchange declined by 8.1 percent over the same period.

Recent Developments

Qantas began B717 services to Hobart on 27 May, operating nine daily return services between Melbourne and Hobart. A new non-stop daily return service between Sydney and Hobart will commence in June. Qantas also began operating B717 services between the Gold Coast and Sydney on 1 June, with eight flights a day. This will increase to 10 a day, as additional B717 aircraft are made available by Airconnex. Effective 15 June, Qantas began operating B717s on three non-stop flights each weekday between the Gold Coast and Melbourne. A fourth non-stop service will be added from 1 July. The use of B717s will produce an increase of approximately 10 percent in seat capacity to and from the Gold Coast, and will lift total capacity into and out of Hobart by nearly 13 percent, by next month.

Qantas announced it will increase the number of weekly services it offers between Australia and Buenos Aires to three from 31 October 2001. The additional service will operate from Sydney to Buenos Aires via Auckland, further developing tourism and business growth in one of Qantas' key international markets.

Qantas Freight announced an alliance with Thai Air Cargo to establish an intra-Asian freighter network. Thai Air Cargo is a privately owned airline with Commercial Transport International (CTI) of Bangkok as its major shareholder. The network will be based in Thailand and will provide express operators and exporters with overnight, prime cargo space into major Asian markets. Operations are due to commence in the second half of 2001, using wide-bodied aircraft.

Following the purchase of Pacific Turbine, Qantas Defence Services (QDS) has commenced operation of its new engine and component maintenance facility at Bankstown. The Bankstown base will allow QDS to centralise all of its defence-related operations in the one facility.

Previously only international passengers who paid greater than 25% of the published fare were included. There has been no change in the domestic definition which already includes all fare paying passengers. Comparative information has not been adjusted.
